LIASION WITH THE DHO's OFFICE

HMIS data reports were promptly submitted promptly to the DHO's office, both weekly and monthly.

Awaiting further documentation from UPMB requested by the DHO's office. This has been applied for and is a prerequisite for acquiring PHC funds which had been delayed by the coronavirus pandemic disruption.

The clinic received visitors from the DHO's office who had come to follow up on the services being offered at the clinic.

CLINIC STAFFING

The clinic currently has 6 full time working staffs. Mr. Bangirana Leodinas, the former security guard, left in February. Absence of a security guard has negatively affected the night duties at the clinic since the safety of the clinic equipment and staff is not guaranteed. However the process of recruiting another security guard is underway.

The enrolled nurse (Martha) started school at Kisiizi Hospital School of Nursing & Midwifery in March 2021 and is always away for 3 full days in a week and partly the 4th day. This has come with more challenges in the numbers of staffing and duty coverage at the clinic.

This calls for consideration of acquiring another staff for the clinic in this regard.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Construction of the two- stance VIP latrine and kitchen for patients and caretakers was completed. The structures are already in use.

Plaster repairs were done inside the clinic. There is also a need for repainting, possibly the lower halves of the walls.

We are currently able to harvest rain water; however there has not been a significant reduction on the expenditure on the water bills. This is because this water has no access to the inside of the clinic where the largest consumption of water is.

The solution to this would be acquiring a water pump that would extend the harvested rain water to the inside of the clinic hence achieving the intended goal of minimizing NWSC water bills expenditure especially in the rainy seasons.
